Careers in the Medical Profession Day. A small group of Year 9 students went to the Oxford Brookes Campus in Swindon to experience a 'careers in the medical profession' day. The day started off with a simulation of a car crash and the students were able to see the different roles played by the NHS professionals as they looked after the 'injured' from the Accident and Emergency Department, undergoing surgery and then recovering on a ward.





Our students were then able to ask questions to healthcare professionals such as social workers, junior doctors, nurses, military medics and occupational therapists.
